5 Top Tips to Stay Safe

Safe: keep safe by being careful not to give out personal information when you are chatting or posting online. Personal information includes your email, address, phone number and password.

Meeet: meeting someone you have only met online can be dangerous. Only do so with your parents' or carers' permission and even then only when they can be present.

Acccepting: accepting emails, IM messages, or opening files, images or texts from people you do not know or trust can lead to problems, sometimes this results in you being frightened, hacked or even worse.

Reliable: while chatting to people you do not know on the internet, if someone asks you to come to their house, or if they can come over, always go over it with an adult. If you do not know them, think 'but do I trust them'

Tell: always tell an adult if something upsets, frightens or if something is inappropriate for your age.



Click CEOP and ChildLine

CEOP (the child exploitation and online protection command) is a command of the UK's national crime agency –NCA-, and is tasked to stop all child abuse. ChildLine is a free 24-hour counselling service for children and young people up to their 19th birthday in the UK provided by the NSPCC.
